Teacher Instructions

- 1. Print these cards onto A4 paper. You will need multiple sets, depending on the size of your class and your planned activity.
- 2. Cut each page in half to separate the two sections (one for each image).
- 3. Give a set of the cards to each group. The recommended group size to share one set of cards is 4 students. Groups can sort the cards into rural versus urban and/or use them as prompts for the other activities.



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Fun Fact: Traditional Japanese homes have tatami mats, made from straw, which cover the floor.





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Fun Fact: Bullet trains are called shinkansen in Japan. They can travel up to 199mph!



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Fun Fact: Tall buildings and skyscrapers in Japan are specially designed so they are safe during earthquakes.



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Fun Fact: Convenience stores are open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.





Fun Fact: Shrines are a Shinto place of worship. Shinto is Japan's very own religion.



Fun Fact: This is Izumo Grand Shrine, it is one of the oldest and most important shrines in Japan.

Fun Fact: The plant growing behind these vending machines is bamboo!



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Fun Fact: Japanese children eat lunch in their classroom. Students take it in turns to serve lunch to their classmates.



Fun Fact: Japanese children clean their schools. Each student is assigned a space to clean.

Fun Fact: The water in hot springs (onsen in Japanese), is naturally hot from the ground! Bathing in hot springs is very relaxing.



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Fun Fact: This restaurant specialises in noodle dishes. The sign to the left of the door means noodle.



Fun Fact: Mos Burger is a fast food restaurant in Japan. The menu includes a teriyaki burger and buns made of rice instead of bread.
