# A Trip to the Japanese Countryside

## **Comparing Localities - Rural and Urban Japan**

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## **Learning Objectives:**

- Students will learn about features of urban and rural areas and their similarities and differences.
- To identify similarities and differences between a rural area and an urban area in Japan.
- Some students will compare their own area (or another area in the UK) to an area in Japan.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

- Students will identify similarities and differences between localities using a venn diagram.
- Some students will identify the benefits and disadvantages of living in different settlements.

#### **Curriculum Links:**

Geography for KS1

- Understand geographical similarities and differences through studying the human and physical geography of a small area of the United Kingdom, and of a small area in a contrasting non-European country.
- Use basic geographical vocabulary to refer to key physical and key human features.

## Geography for KS2

- Locate the world's countries
- Describe and understand key aspects of human and physical geography

#### **Keywords:**

urban, rural, city, countryside, town, village, settlement, transport, agriculture, farming, mountains, forest, populous/population, similarities and differences, benefits and disadvantages.

## Task 1

- Start by asking students about Japan's location e.g. Which continent is it in? Can they identify it on the map? Who are Japan's neighbours? etc. as appropriate for your class.
- Play the short 'vote with your feet' warm-up game in the presentation. Designate one side of the classroom as 'Japan' and one side 'UK'. Students will 'vote' for the answer by moving to the relevant side after each question.

**Estimated Time: 5-10 mins** 

## Task 2

- The final warm-up question is about cities and shows Tokyo and Japan. Ask what adjectives they could use to describe them? How about where they live? How about Japan as well as cities, what other settlements might there be?
- Play the short video A Trip to the Japanese Countryside, then ask students questions to check their understanding and encourage them to think more about cities versus rural areas.

## **Suggested Questions KS1**

- What did you see in the city clip in the video?
- What did you see in the countryside part of the video?
- What did you see that you would also see in the UK?
- What did you see that you wouldn't normally see in the UK?
- What kinds of transport did you see?
- What differences did you notice between the city and the countryside in the video?
- What differences did you notice between the countryside in Japan and in the UK?

#### **Suggested Questions KS2**

- What did you see that you would also see in the UK?
- What did you see that you wouldn't normally see in the UK?
- What words could we use to describe the place in the video?
- Why might people want to live in a rural area in Japan?
- Why might some people want to move to the city?
- As a think pair share activity, show students the slide with a satellite view of Tokyo and Takataki (where the video was filmed) side by side. Ask each student to come up with at least one similarity and one difference between the photos and share with their partner.

**Estimated Time: 10 mins** 

Task 3

Show students more images of rural/urban Japan in the presentation. There are both general

images and comparisons of different facilities. Check they are familiar with the key terms as you go. If students have studied human versus physical features, you could ask them to identify these. (See

additional resources for the link to a BBC Bitesize video on this topic).

**Estimated Time: 5-10 minutes** 

Task 4

Split the class into small groups, giving each a set of the images showing both rural and urban

Japan which they have seen in the presentation. Students should group the images according to

whether they are urban or rural. Then pick 1 or more of the activities below.

Activity 1 (recommended for KS1/lower KS2) Students should write down similarities and differences

they notice between the two sets of images, either individually or as a group. See additional resources

for a venn diagram template.

Activity 2 (recommended for KS1/lower KS2) Pick one set of images (either urban or rural) to compare to

the students' local area or another area chosen by the teacher.

Activity 3 (recommended for upper KS2 or high ability students) Tell students to imagine they have been

offered an opportunity to move to Japan and can choose the city or the countryside. Each group will

make a list of the benefits and disadvantages of living in their chosen area. The video and images serve

as prompts for group discussion.

Estimated Time: 15 minutes +

**Plenary** 

Ask students: 'Would you like to live in the Japanese countryside or in a city? Why?' You can revisit

the 'Vote with your feet' game, this time with a 'Yes' side and a 'No' side.

Call on several students to share their opinion.

**Estimated Time: 3 minutes**
