Learning Objectives

- Read and sequence the key parts of the Momotaro (Peach Boy) story
- Develop note-making skills by summarising key parts of the Momotaro (Peach Boy) Story
- Practise speaking aloud and giving/receiving peer feedback.

Learning Outcomes

• Using summarising skills to create a detailed Kamishibai plan.

English National Curriculum Links

Year 2:

Understand both the books that they can already read accurately and fluently and those that they listen to by:

- Drawing on what they already know or on background information and vocabulary provided by the teacher
- Checking that the text makes sense to them as they read, and correcting inaccurate reading

Understand what they read, in books they can read independently, by:

- Checking that the text makes sense to them, discussing their understanding, and explaining the meaning of words in context
- Identifying main ideas drawn from more than 1 paragraph and summarising these.

Example Storyboard (Momotaro)

Task 1: What is a summary?

1. Identify what the word summary means. How do you summarise a text? Take feedback then go through general principles. Perhaps model with an example text e.g. a known fairy tale (see resource).

Estimated Time: 20 minutes

Task 2: Learning to Sequence Stories

- 1. Students create a story skeleton by summarising the Peach Boy or Moon Princess story into key parts (see pre-prepared template.) Each story part is written in the form of a newspaper headline e.g. 1. OLD MAN AND OLD WOMAN LIVE IN SMALL HOUSE; 2. OLD WOMAN GOES TO THE RIVER TO WASH CLOTHES AND FINDS GIANT PEACH etc.
 - Alternatively, present the students with the pre-prepared story skeleton.
- 2. Discuss the headlines of the skeleton to ensure all important story parts have been included in the summary and that the story parts are in sequence.

Estimated Time: 20 minutes

Task 3: Make a Kamishibai Plan

1. Create a storyboard (kamishibai plan) using the story skeleton by drawing images for each story part. Each summarised story part is illustrated in one panel of the blank storyboard (these illustrations form a first draft of the kamishibai card illustrations). They do not need to be detailed but should include all important aspects of that part of the story.

Estimated Time: 25 minutes

Feedback: Sharing original storyboards

- Review the storyboard by sharing with another group.
- Students give peer feedback to ensure that all important information has been included and that the sequence of the story is correct.

Estimated Time: 10 minutes

Extension Activities (This may form Lesson 6 of the progression of lessons)

- 1. Continue illustrating the story parts on the storyboard planner.
- For classes that are at a lower level, you might want to consider completing the Summarising Stories worksheet or giving out prepared images or text as a guide. Look at the Example Storyboard (Momotaro).
