





### **2020 Summer Olympics**

The modern Olympic Games are actually inspired by ancient religious and athletic festivals held every four years in Olympia which can be dated back to 776 BC in Ancient Greece. The first modern Olympic Games were held in Athens in 1896. It was attended by 12 different countries with 280 athletes competing in 43 events.

This year will be the 32nd Summer Olympic Games. The Games will be the fourth Olympics hosted by Japan and it will also be the first time a country in Asia has held the Summer Games twice!




### **Japan and the 2020 Olympics**






The national stadium was designed by a famous Japanese architect called Kengo Kuma. The wood that was used to build it came from all 47 prefectures in Japan.

Did you know? Medals for the 2020 Olympics were made using recycled metals from electronic devices donated by residents in Japan.

Japanese Tea Ceremony. It means "The Way of Tea" in Japanese. It is a ceremonial way of preparing and drinking green tea.


C. 歌舞伎 Kabuki




### **Japan Detectives**






### **Kanji Characters**


In the Japanese writing system, there are 3 sets of characters: hiragana, katakana, and kanji. The word *kanji* literally means 'Chinese characters' because Japan borrowed them from China's writing system.

In Japanese, Japan is called **Nihon** (pronounced knee-hon). The kanji characters **=** and **\*** mean 'sun' and 'origin' and the reason why Japan is sometimes known as the 'Land of the Rising Sun' in Western countries.
